Helping Mississippi's Children Succeed

Since 2003, we've implemented core programming in Mississippi. We currently partner with **17 schools and communities** in **10 counties**, serving **6,700 children**.

OUR MISSISSIPPI PROGRAMS GET RESULTS

2011 RESULTS: Literacy Results: Children in our program read an average of **52 books** during the school year and more than **59% of participants** showed significant reading improvement. On average, literacy improvement among program participants was equivalent to an **additional 4.1 months of schooling**.

Health Results: Children participated in an average of **3 I minutes of physical activity** per day and were introduced to nutritious snack options.

National Early Steps Results: 84% of 3-year-olds in our Early Steps program scored at or above the normal range for vocabulary acquisition.

Resilient and Ready Results: We trained **469 Mississippi adults** and **5,738 children** in disaster preparedness.

CORE PROGRAMS IN MISSISSIPPI

The Early Steps to School Success program is designed to assist children, from birth to age 5, with language, social and emotional development; to equip parents with the skills and knowledge to successfully support their child's growth; and to develop strong home-school connections.

Ages 0–5

The **Literacy** program provides children in elementary school with the opportunity to increase their reading achievement by supplying the tools they need to develop reading skills and the guidance and support they need to grow as readers. Ages 5–12

The **Healthy Choices** program aims to increase children's information and access to regular physical activity and healthy snacks in a school environment. Ages 5–12

CREATING IMMEDIATE AND LASTING CHANGE FOR CHILDREN

POLICY & ADVOCACY

We advocate for initiatives and legislation at the state and national level that promote children's wellbeing and resiliency, including the necessity of quality early education programs, funding for underserved school districts, childcare emergency preparedness, and the reversal of the childhood obesity epedemic through the Campaign for Healthy Kids, a Robert Wood Johnson Foundation partnership.

Results: In 2011, policy changes championed by Save the Children stand to benefit **40 million American kids**; we improved child health and wellness policies in ten states; and since 2009, we've influenced disaster preparedness policy changes in 22 states.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE & RECOVERY

We respond directly to disaster-affected communities, working to address unmet needs of children through Child-Friendly Spaces, supervised play areas in shelters, and long-term resiliency support to children and caregivers through our Journey of Hope program.

Results: In response to Hurricane Katrina, we served nearly **200,000 children and caregivers** in Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama, through Child-Friendly Spaces, donating supplies and providing emotional support through our signature Journey of Hope program. In 2011, we served more than **46,000 children**, **families and caregivers** through our disaster readiness, response and recovery programs nationwide.

SPONSORSHIP

Our child sponsorship program gives children living in poverty a chance at a brighter future by supporting Save the Children's programs in communities to ensure access to quality education, healthy foods and opportunities to grow in a nurturing environment.

Results: Currently, **500 children** in our Mississippi programs receive sponsorship.

EFFECTS OF POVERTY IN MISSISSIPPI

32.4% of children live in poverty; in rural areas, it's **37%**.²

71% of children are eligible for free or reduced-priced meals, a socioeconomic challenge recognized as a barrier to student achievement³

49% of 4th graders scored below the basic level of reading achievement on the National Assessment of Educational Progress.⁴

36% of children ages 3 to 5 are not enrolled in nursery school, preschool or kindergarten.⁵

2 of 5 rural children ages 10 to 17 are overweight or obese (38.5%).⁶

17.6% of rural children are obese, or have a body mass index exceeding the 95th percentile for the age and gender.⁷
